Keymaster/IndoorRange Captain/Gate Monitor:

The plywood on the outside of the side door to the indoor range keeps the rain water out. If you use the door, please put the plywood in front of the door when you are finished.

3. Arm guards and side quivers for weekend visitors need to be replaced.

## Old Business

We need to begin preparation for the Stickbows in the Redwoods and 3D in the Redwoods shoots. We'll assess and repair animals at the first work party in March. We need volunteers and a raffle chair. Brian Tracy has previously been the Food Chair and said he wants to do it again. We need publicity and perhaps a range banner. The range is in really good shape right now.

## New Business

No new members this month.

Someone wants to use the indoor range for an IBO Hunter Training on March 12 & 13, Friday night and all day Saturday. This would mean that the range is not open to the public that Saturday. Scott moves that we allow the class. Approved with unanimous vote and 2 abstentions. Larry suggests that Henry negotiate the fee which will be a \$50 minimum.

We need to keep water from coming in the side door. Randy thinks it's seeping up from under the cement. We'll table the topic and investigate more. Maybe put in a French drain? Andy Sterbenz will take a look at the problem sometime when it's raining.

Henry wants a moveable target that is tall enough for adults for the indoor range. The target we have now is too short. He initially suggested a target with adjustable height, but we decided we can build a cart that holds 3 superbales that can be wheeled beside the wall when not needed, e.g. during club shoots.

Randy moves that we spend up to \$300 to purchase arm guards and side quivers to replace worn out items used by club members and for training new archers. Scott seconds. Unanimous. Henry will purchase the items.

We need new outdoor targets for the year. Henry will get them.

Randy reports that the roof is leaking. Henry will call Matt to discuss it.

## More club history (Don MacAngus)

I saw an obituary in the SC Sentinel the other day for "Don Stefani". He's passed away at the age of 91 and used to be in the restaurant business in Santa Cruz. I didn't know him myself but I remember when I was an archery club member, years ago, some of the old timers would mention guys that used to be members of the archery club in the early days, and once in awhile the name "Stefani" would be mentioned.

When I saw the obituary I contacted Scott Edwards, who is probably the "last man standing" from the early archery club days. Scott lives in Roseville now, is in his mid 70's, and has started shooting the bow again !! He sends me an email once in awhile to let me know how he's doing. Scott joined the club when he was a teenager, in the early '50's, back when the original SCA club members were active. I asked Scott if he knew Don Stefani.

Scott replied and said; "yes" he did, he knew him back then, and in fact there were three Stefani's, and all were involved in archery at one time or another. Don Stefani was the brother to Ron Stefani, and both were sons of Fred Stefani, the father. According to Scott, the reason the archery range is where it is today is due to the efforts of Fred Stefani. Scott says he has in his possession a topographical map showing the "proposed roving archery range" dated 1961, and says he'll bring it down one of these days and show it to me.

I do know the club almost folded in the '60's, reportedly due to internal disagreements between the old-time club members, and almost everyone walked away from the sport. One person, Maurice Anstiss, a club member, kept things going single-handedly. He kept the club charter current with the NFAA, out of his own funds, kept one 14 target unit

shootable, himself, so the range wouldn't be lost. Maurice knew that to keep the range, the club had to have insurance that protected the City, and to have NFAA insurance, the charter had to be current, and to have a charter, the range had to be an NFAA approved range. A 14 target unit met that requirement, so that's what Maurice did. Himself. Single handedly. Maurice was a great guy, I knew him, and I shot with him many times. Maurice always shot barebow, had a beautiful Hoyt recurve bow, and shot instinctive. He didn't stringwalk, but he shot quite well, and usually in the mid-400's on the field round. Larry Yien now is the proud owner of Maurice's bow.

Maurice Anstiss passed away in 1984, at the age of 79.

Cal Delaney, an archer than lived in Santa Cruz but was a member of the Salinas Bowmen, found the SC range one day, met Maurice Anstiss, and wanted to get the Santa Cruz club, and range, going again. He advertised in the newspaper that the SC Archers were scheduling a club meeting, and invited all previous members of the club to attend. Many showed up, and Cal successfully got things going again. Shortly after that is when I joined, February 1, 1973. The club had seven members at the time, and were planning the Open Shoot, the Animal Heyday. We pulled it off successfully.

When I joined the club, in 1973, Cal Delaney was president and he told me that the range had been "there" for many years but originally had been more up on top. When the golf course went it they bulldozed the bales and targets down into the canyon, with no prior notice to the archery club. The members rebuilt the range, down in the canyon, where it is now, and when completed scheduled the first club shoot on the "new" range. On the last work day before the club shoot Cal fell

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and broke his leg. Never-the-less he shot the club shoot, on crutches.

I shot with Cal many times, he was a great guy, a good family man, and a great shot with the bow. In the recurve days he shot a Root recurve, freestyle, and set range records with it. The clubs indoor range building is there because of Cal's efforts. A lot of people worked on the building, but the idea and the dream, was Cal's.

Cal passed away in 1997, at the age of 57.

## Chain rules (Henry Bertram)

You may have noticed that there is a chain that can be locked across the exit road between the Disk Golf gate, at the entrance to their parking lot, and our exit gate. The chain is there to discourage people from parking in the cut-out areas next to the road. That's a problem because of the erosion that parking there causes and because the people parking there have been known to block the road.

The archery range road is actually the emergency exit route for Santa Cruz's emergency communications center near the Stroke Center. That's why the gates seem to open in the wrong direction. The gates open correctly for people leaving the communications center when the entrance road to the golf course is blocked.

The city would like the chain to be up when the archery range gate is closed. Randy Redmond has been kind enough to ensure that the chain is always up when he leaves Saturdays and Sundays but there have been times when the chain was down anyway. That, of course, could be the work of others with gate keys.

The same rules that apply to our gates apply to the chain. Leave them the way you found them. The exception is, if our range exit gate is locked, and you see the chain open, please lock the chain across the road unless there are cars parked between the chain and the gate.

## Indoor Shoots (Henry Bertram)

Beside the great camaraderie and a fun and challenging NFAA indoor round, there are goodies showing up at the indoor. Our thanks to the Gardners and Candace Douglas for the cookies, cake, dip and snacks that keep us going!
